**FIRST SATURDAYS DEVOTION**

These are troubled times in our nation and for Holy Mother Church. Our Lady is calling on her children in America to act on her request for a devotion to her Immaculate Heart – beginning with the Five First Saturdays Devotion - this is an act of reparation for the blasphemies and ingratitude that pierce her Immaculate Heart.

After the apparitions of Our Lady in Fatima, Portugal in 1917, Our Lady returned to ask for a devotion to her Immaculate Heart and the consecration of Russia. **Reason**

A normal individual, according to God's plan, is a person who does not follow all his emotions and let them guide him. That is "the blind leading the blind". The emotions are fickle and unpredictable. They always want pleasure. And pleasure is good sometimes and sometimes it is bad. A person is angry and his anger tells him it would be very good to knock this guy's block off. But reason, our highest faculty, says to us that that would only make things worse. You can't always do what your emotions want to do. You must follow reason. God inspired, reason. The Greek philosophers said, "Let reason rule," God has given us our intelligence to guide us. He expects us to use it.

Sometimes our emotions say that the "Ten Commandments" are old fashioned and we don't need to follow them, even though God gave them to us as the rules for life. But our emotions can be wrong. Let reason rule. Reason says that God is wiser than we are and if He has given us these rules this is what we must do.

We are often like a little kid who wants to run into the street to play. It is delightful to run in the street; it is so different. But his father, who is wiser, says he can't have fun in the street. To the little kid, his father is being mean and doesn't want him to have any fun. But we expect the little kid to obey his father, even if he doesn't understand why at that moment in time.

It is the same with us and with God; obedience is expected--required. A youth can play basketball and follow the rules and have a good game; or he can play ignoring the rules and ruin everything. The Ten Commandments are our rules for living on earth, they apply at all times, we can't use them sometimes and sometimes-- not.

To live properly, reason must evaluate what emotions, always in a hurry, want to do. Right reason must guide us. Reason says we should eat healthy food; but our emotional urges want junk food. Reason says we need light to see, but not too much light; we should not look directly into the sun, at high noon, for instance, lest it damage our eyesight. Reason says the ear is for sound, but we shouldn't get too close to a loud noise.

Right reason tells us we are creatures and God is the creator of us and He is infinitely wiser than we are or ever will be. When He tells us to do something; that what we should do, for He is wise and we are not. We may not like to do it, just as a child doesn't like to go to bed and get the healthy sleep that it needs, but it is best for us. Not only does God know what is best, since He made us, but He loves us even more than we love ourselves and whatever He tells us to do is for our own good, no matter whether we agree or understand it or not.

**REVIEW YOUR FAITH**

**What does hope oblige us to do?**

**St. Kateri Kekakwitha** was born near the town of Auriesville, New York, in the year 1656, the daughter of a Mohawk warrior. She was four years old when her mother died of small-pox. The disease also attacked Kateri and transfigured her face.

Kateri became converted as a teenager. She was baptized at the age of twenty and incurred the great hostility of her tribe. Although she had to suffer greatly for her Faith, she remained firm in it. Kateri went to the new Christian colony of Indians in Canada. Here she lived a life dedicated to prayer, penitential practices, and care for the sick and aged. Every morning, even in bitterest winter, she stood before the chapel door until it opened at four and remained there until after the last Mass. She was devoted to the Eucharist and to Jesus Crucified. She died on April 7, 1680, at the age of twenty-four. She is known as the "Lily of the Mohawks".

**Prayer:** Lord, You called the Virgin, Saint Kateri, to shine forth among the Indian people as an example of purity of life. Grant, through her intercession, that all peoples of every tribe, tongue and nation, may be gathered into Your Church and proclaim Your greatness in one song of praise. Amen.
