There is a famous painting by Holman Hunt, a lantern in his hand. When he had finished this beautiful masterpiece he called in his neighbor to see it. The neighbor admired it very much, but then he added, "There is only one thing wrong." "What is that?" the artist asked. The other said, "There is no handle on the door." The great artist smiled and said quietly, "That door represents the human heart. Jesus stands at the door knocking. But it can only be opened from the inside."

These are words to ponder. Jesus said, "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in."

These gracious words of Jesus show how patient and long suffering he is, waiting for us to open the door. He wants to come in and bring us His gifts, especially His unselfish love.
